 - ii. The book was there on the table. I'd never read Moby Dick and I didn't intend to do so now.
 - iii. Michael went to the bank. He was annoyed because it was closed.
 - iv. He sat down at the table and took a small box from his pocket. The object felt heavy in his hands. Inside it was the key to his future.
 - v. It entered silently, the cat was a supreme hunter.
 - vi. I drove the car to the parking lot and left it there.
 - vii. When Ana entered the room, she was distraught.

- b) Using appropriate examples, distinguish between the following sets of terms in relation to how meaning is established within a text.

iii.	Denotation and connotation	(6 marks)

Question Four

The words, phrases, and sentences people use have meanings, as well as actions and deeds; the manner in which they have been organized results in various embedded meanings. Referring to this statement:

- a) According to Geoffrey Leech, describe the following 'seven types of meaning' that should be considered:
 - i. Logical or Conceptual meaning
 - ii. Connotative meaning
 - iii. Social meaning
 - iv. Affective meaning
 - v. Reflected meaning
 - vi. Collocative meaning
 - vii. Thematic meaning
